Around 20 firefighters were called to tackle a severe blaze at a city centre restaurant last week.

West Midlands Fire Service received an emergency call to China Red restaurant and karaoke bar in Hertford Street at around 4.45am.

Four fire engines were sent to tackle the blaze in the three-storey building and were still there at 9.30am.

A spokesman for the service said: "The incident involved a severe fire. Approximately 40 per cent of the building was damaged by the fire.

"Police are in attendance at the incident. There is nothing to suggest the cause at the moment."

Junior doctors in England are refusing to go to work.

It's because of an argument with the government about changes to their pay and working hours. The government is telling doctors that they have to work longer hours and during more anti-social hours (like at night or the weekends). To make things even worse they will not get more pay for doing so.

The government says it wants to improve hospital services at weekends, but many doctors say the new plans aren't safe and will put patients at risk. This is because doctors will have to work extra long hours and will be really tired when treating people: this might lead to them making mistakes.

On the other hand, it is hard not to see the governments point of view: people still need doctors at the weekend and at night time and paying for doctors is expensive – top junior doctors earn more that £70, 000 a year.
