#### Key Vocabulary

**Moat** - the moat is the body of water surrounding a castle.

**Drawbridge** - the drawbridge is a wooden walkway which can lead welcome visitors across the moat and be closed to prevent access from enemies.

**Watchtower** - the watchtower is the tallest part of the castle and had the best view over the surrounding kingdom.

**Turret** - the turrets are used to shoot cannons through.

**Peep hole** - the peep hole is the perfect size to shoot arrows through and also look for oncoming attackers.

**Feudal system** - the way society was structured in medieval times.

**Magna Carta** - the first official common laws.

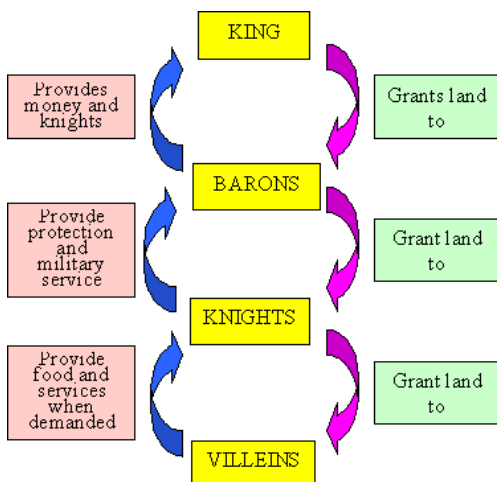
