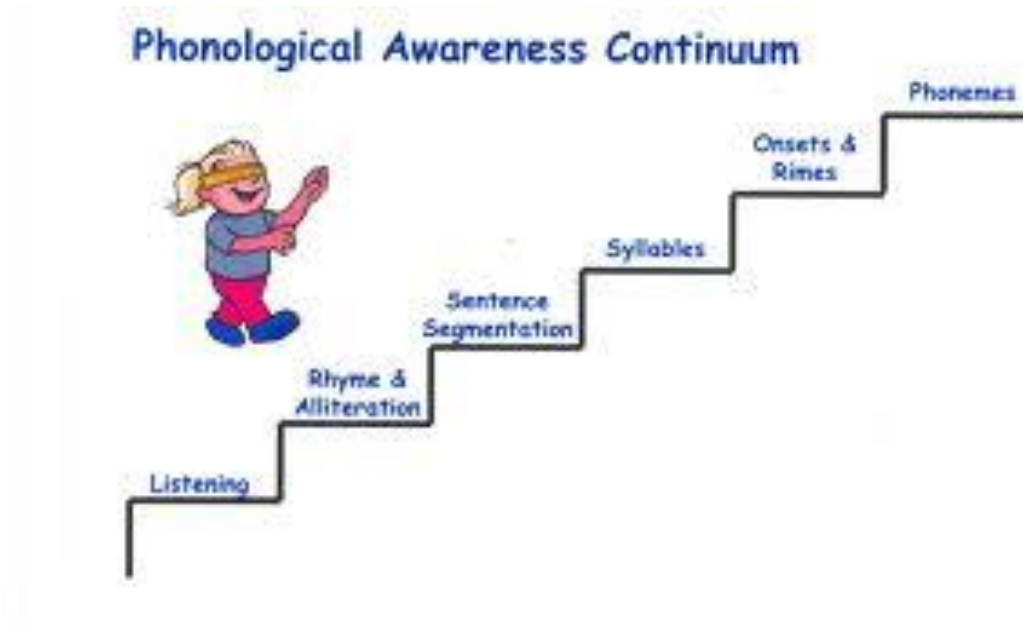


Nursery Phonics progression

Children in Early Years need to build up pre-phonics skills in order to be ready to learn the phonemes in Reception. Securing these early skills will help children become more confident readers.



At Courthouse Green we begin a child's reading journey by developing their phonological awareness in our 2 year old provision with opportunities to tune into sounds and to listen and remember sounds that they can talk about. Children are encouraged to distinguish between sounds through activities that promote sound discrimination in the environment such as nature walks. This skill is then developed further by exploring instrumental and body percussion sounds.

Once children reach Nursery the ability to discriminate and distinguish sounds, continues to be embedded through regular practise and then their phonological awareness is built upon by introducing rhyme and alliteration, syllables, voice sounds, sentence segmentation and onset and rhyme.
