#### **Reading in Triumph Trust**

Within Triumph trust we believe that a love of reading is crucial for all children, if children love reading they will want to read more and if children read more their skills as a reader will develop and grow allowing them to secure a lifelong skill. We ensure that children develop this through regular reading opportunities across the curriculum. Our aim is to provide the children with texts that are both mirrors into their own lives and windows into the lives of others whilst encouraging the children to use their imaginations through texts that promote awe and wonder.

As a trust, our ambitious curriculum has an intent of talk, feel, question, reflect and it is our belief that this will be woven into all reading experiences our children will have. This will be done through the following ways:

- Talk discussion about a text, author, theme, making a prediction prior to reading and throughout. Making links with prior learning and knowledge, have you read a book by this author before? Talking about common themes identified within texts.
- Feel having an emotional hook, having texts that represent children's lives, allowing them to empathise with characters and allowing them to escape to other worlds.
- Question questioning motives and character, the ability to question challenging ideas/themes, questioning authors choices, questioning their personal opinions/preconceived ideas – do they change from the reading experiences.
- Reflect children are given opportunities to reflect on what they have read and this could be done through discussing big questions at appropriate times within a text.

All of the above will be achieved through our continuing focus on ensuring children are exposed to high-level vocabulary, which they can articulate, and use across the curriculum.

The following literary spine provides a list of texts that are provided for each class as story time readers and to enhance their class reading areas. This will ensure that children hear, enjoy and join in with quality texts. These texts are read to the children by skilled adults who will plays the role of a storyteller, they can then select these or similar texts from their class reading area to read independently. It is the expectation that staff share these books and make links between authors and themes within the texts and guidance will be provided to support.

These texts have been carefully selected using a range of expert and recommended spines including the Pie Corbett, CLPE, RWInc and books for topic recommended lists. They are recommended to specific age groups of children therefore ensuring that they are pitched correctly in word reading ability and content. In addition to these texts, there are occasions where non-fiction and poetry texts are also shared and enjoyed to interest those readers who prefer these genres and to expose children to a breadth of genres.

Texts within the literary spine have been carefully selected for a range of reasons, these include:

- To expose the children to a range of key and classical authors throughout school.
- To represent the children of Triumph Trust; they include texts that are written by authors of colour and with key characters of colour as well as those with Special Educational Needs and Disabilities that are represented in school and beyond. They also include other experiences that we know some of our children have lived such as poverty, homelessness and being a refugee.
- To ensure that children are exposed to different genres including, adventure, fantasy, mystery, myth and legend, dilemmas, historical fiction, traditional tales and classical texts.
- To consolidate understanding of themes taught within the curriculum.
- To be exposed to texts and authors they may be unfamiliar with but allow them opportunities to engage with rich, high quality texts

Alongside our story time texts, which will be books that all children in our trust are read to before they leave our schools, we have also created a list of supplementary texts. These books will be displayed and kept in classrooms and within the school library to allow teachers to give children recommendations based on what they have read during story times. It will allow children further opportunities to widen their reading experiences and knowledge of authors. We will also ensure our libraries will include well-known key authors that children enjoy such as Alex Rider, David Walliams, Judy Bloome, Quentin Blake, AA Milne, Cressida Cowell, JK Rowling and Terry Pratchett. Throughout the year, we will discuss with children the well-known key authors and ensure they are not limited in their knowledge.
